Pastors Corner

Dear Friends,

In my Ash Wednesday meditation I invited the congregation to use the Lord's Prayer as the basis for their Lenten discipline. I invited them to pray that prayer every day during Lent (from now until Easter, April 4), and then spend some time in meditating on it, especially the three phrases: "thy kingdom come ...," "give us our daily bread ...," and "forgive us our debts ...". The prayer helps connect us to God and those three phrases are a wonderful summary of what we believe and are about as followers of Jesus. John Dominic Crossan has written in *The Historical Jesus: the Life of a Mediterranean Jewish Peasant* that the Lord's Prayer serves "as a beautiful summary of the themes and emphases in Jesus' vision of the kingdom of God." (page 294)

Praying for the kingdom of God to come is a radical act both personally and politically. In the Lord's Prayer we are asking God to transform our personal lives, to make us more loving, compassionate and justice-living. We are also asking God to be king and not Caesar, and we are praying for the transformation of the world into what it would be like if God were really in charge and not Caesar. Hal Taussig wrote in his book *Jesus Before God* that a prayer for the coming of the kingdom of God "in the situation of a people colonialized by Rome was just a little short of a call to revolution." (page 83)

When we pray for God's kingdom to come, we are asking for *our* daily bread (not just my daily bread) and we are asking for *our* debts to be forgiven. Again, quoting Crossan, "Bread and debt were quite simply ... the two most immediate problems facing the Galilean peasant, day laborer and non-elite urbanite. Alleviation of these two anxieties were the most obvious benefits of God's reign." (*The Historical Jesus*, page 294)

So, I invite us all to: 1) find a time every day during Lent to pray the Lord's Prayer (pray it aloud if you can); 2) take some time to meditate on the words and phrases: the kingdom of God, give us our daily bread, and forgive us our debts. Ponder how we can allow God to transform us into more loving, justice-living people and how we can help the world's poor find and receive their daily bread, and how we can forgive the debts of the poor, so they are free to live.

The handout many of you received in worship recently from Bread for the World entitled "Lenten Prayers for Hungry People" is a helpful guide with suggested scripture readings, prayers, reflections, and action suggestions around the theme of hunger. It has suggestions for every week of Lent. We still have some available on the usher's shelf and on the table by the office.

Have a meaningful Lenten journey. Let's pray together the Lord's Prayer (from the Gospel of Matthew):

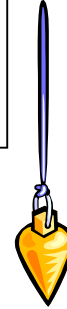

Children / Youth

We have a group of 3 to 5-year olds, a group of 6 to 9-year-olds, and a group of 10 to 12-year-olds. Collectively, these three groups have come together and decided to use the One-Room-Schoolhouse model. They gather together on Sunday mornings and pretty much function as a unit with the older children working with other older children and at some points they work with the younger children.

I was with them for a short time last Sunday and I must tell you that it was pretty impressive. The children were talking about one of the stories of our faith. It was the one about Jesus teaching in the temple. I was really inspired listening to them talk about it. I think you would be very pleased.

Adults

The adults meet in the conference room adjacent to the staff offices at 9:00am on Sunday mornings. This semester we have been studying 8th Century Prophecy which is found in the texts of First Isaiah (Chapters 1-39 of the Book of Isaiah), Amos, Hosea, and Micah all of which are found in the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament). We're reading chapters 32 and 33 of Isaiah this week. Please come and join us; you can start at any time.

Training for Child/Youth Protection Program

We have held two training sessions for the "Child/Youth Protection Program." The program consists of a series of videotapes that present actual offenders who speak about how they offended and how they got away with it. They talk unabashedly about how they were able to attract children and how they were able to keep parents and other adults at bay. Discussion follows the viewing. At our last training we had very animated discussion. I have been asked to offer the program again and will do so before too long. I will let you know when it will be offered again. The program is free. The Episcopal Diocese of Iowa and the Lutheran Synod own copies of the training program and have been very generous in making them available to trained trainers (that's me).

Some reflections on Lent

This Lent thing we do at St Tims is really quite unusual; actually, it's quite counter-cultural. In this day and age you seldom see children and adults announcing (by our ashes on our foreheads) that we are out of relationship with ourselves, with our neighbors, with our God and with the earth. The wonderment of Lent is that it gives us permission to get our relationships in order.

Isaiah gives us some guideposts to check-in with as we begin this process. He tells us that our fast should include "loosing the bonds of injustice, letting the oppressed go free, shar-

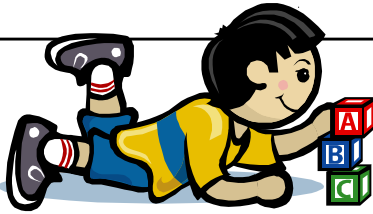

ing bread with the hungry, bringing the homeless into your home, covering the naked.” Isaiah says that when we do this our light will break forth and God will say, “Here I am!”

Where are you with your relationship with yourself? Where are you in relationship to others? Where are you in relationship with God? Where are you in relationship with the earth? This season is about change; it’s about turning your heart toward God. Take the opportunity to do just that. Turn your heart to God.

Study Groups to begin a new book in March

New Study Series: *A New Spiritual Home: Progressive Christianity at the Grass Roots*
 In March we will begin a study of Hal Taussig's book, *A New Spiritual Home: Progressive Christianity at the Grass Roots*. A new kind of Christianity is emerging at the grass roots. Full of heart-felt expression, artistic creativity, and liberal social values, progressive churches and small Christian communities have established themselves across the denominational spectrum. Reporting on a national research study that undercuts the impression that right-wing Christianity is the only new development on the contemporary American religious landscape, Hal Taussig identifies thousands of progressive churches and para-churches and describes five characteristics of this new movement. He then proceeds to analyze its blind spots, project its future, and suggest how to start a progressive church.

Focus on NE Iowa Food Bank and Nothing But Nets-Rainbow GREEN & RED

Our Lenten offerings (Palm Sunday and Maundy Thursday) will be shared with the NE Iowa Food Bank and Nothing But Nets. The Nothing But Nets campaign can prevent malaria by 50% in Africa. A \$10 bed net stops mosquitoes from biting during the night and spreading the disease, and the insecticide on the net kills the mosquitoes when they land on it. Canterbury Forum

Theme: "Why Them? Why Then?: The Great Witch Craze"

Speaker: Dr. Charlotte Wells, Department of History, UNI

Date: Sunday, March 21 at 7:00 p.m.

Place: Will Hall, St. Luke's Episcopal Church, Cedar Falls (doors open 6:30)

Everyone's heard of the Salem witch trials in in the late 1600's, but few people know about the three preceding centuries of violent paranoia over "diabolical" witches' supposed efforts to destroy European civilization. Dr. Charlotte Wells will walk us through the Great Witch Craze, explaining why the fears of evil magic rose to a frenzy in the late Middle Ages and why so many of those accused of witchcraft were women. Was there an organized cult of witches out to overthrow society? Was it all a plot of men against women? How do the witch trials relate to fear of Jews, lepers, gypsies, and other outsiders? And, finally, how do these events resonate in the contemporary world? There's much to think and talk about besides flying on broomsticks.
